The levels are called 'P levels'.□ At the end of each key stage (i.e. at the end of year 2 and year 6) all children are required to be formally assessed using Standard Assessment Tests (SATs). This is something the government requires all schools to do and the results that are published nationally.□ Children at School Action and School Action Plus will have an IEP (or PLP) which will be reviewed with your involvement, every term and the plan for the next term made.□ The progress of children with a statement of SEN/ EHC Plan is formally reviewed at an Annual Review with all adults involved with the child's education.□ The Senior Inclusion Leader/Inclusion Co-ordinator will also check that your child is making good progress within any individual work and in any group that they take part in.□ You will be informed of your child's attainment level at parent afternoons / evenings by the class teacher□ You can enquire of their level at any time by asking the class teacher or Senior Inclusion Leader
<p>What support do we have for you as a parent of child with an SEN?</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none">□ We would like you to talk to your child's class teacher regularly, so we know what they are doing at home and we can tell you about what we are doing in school. We hope this will make sure that we are doing similar things to support them both at home and school and can share what is working in both places.□ The Senior Inclusion Leader/ Inclusion Co-ordinator (or Head teacher) is available to meet with you to discuss your child's progress or any concerns/worries you may have.□ All information from outside professionals will be discussed with you with the person involved directly, or where this is not possible, in a report. The Senior Inclusion Leader / Inclusion Co-ordinator will also arrange to meet with you to discuss any new assessments and ideas suggested by outside agencies for your child.
