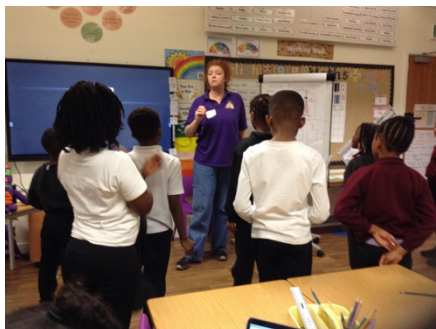

Young Engineers Club

The Young Engineers Club has made a fantastic start with two engaging sessions focused on hands-on learning, application of knowledge and teamwork.

In the first lesson, students built a manual car, helping them become familiar with their classmates, the engineering kits, and basic mechanical components. They learned the names and measurements of technic bricks and axles, explored speed-increasing and speed-decreasing transmissions, and practised calculating transmission ratios. Students were especially excited to see how a gear-shifting system affects a car's speed, and they enjoyed testing and playing with their finished models.

During the second lesson, students built a Spinning Top Bouncer, developing their understanding of speed-increasing transmissions. They learned that gears on a mutual axle make the same number of rotations, regardless of their size, and were introduced to a double speed-increasing transmission. Students successfully calculated a transmission ratio of 1:25 and enjoyed experimenting with and upgrading their spinning tops.

Both lessons were highly interactive, with students showing great enthusiasm and curiosity. We look forward to seeing how they grapple with making conveyor belts, and watching their skills and confidence continue to grow in the weeks ahead.

We have some spaces for new members in our Tuesday club for Y4-6, and are starting a club for the younger children in January. Hopefully more of you can join us!

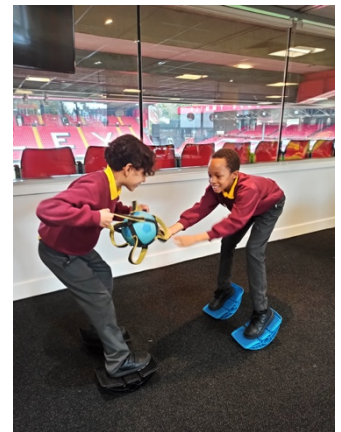
Travel for Life Ambassadors

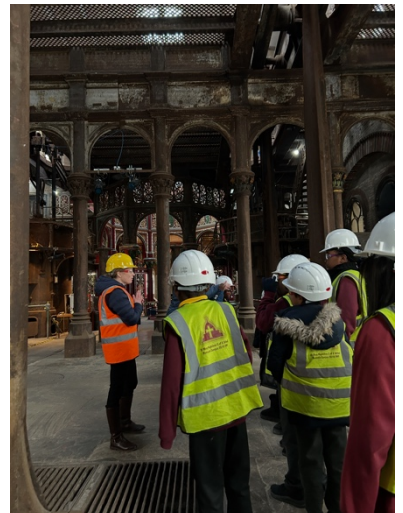


Crossness Pumping Station

The night was organised to showcase the amazing skills and talent our students have, from Year 7 to Sixth Form.

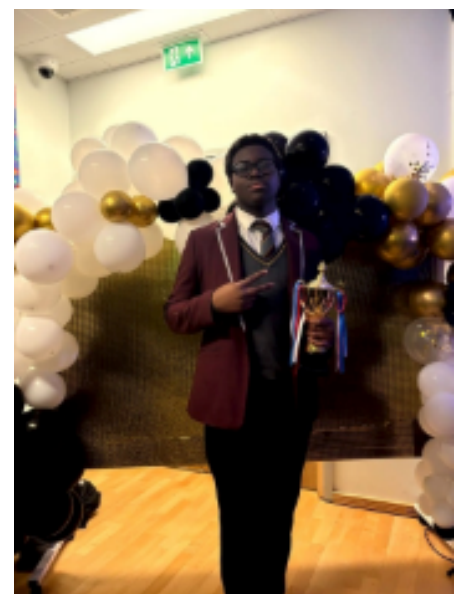
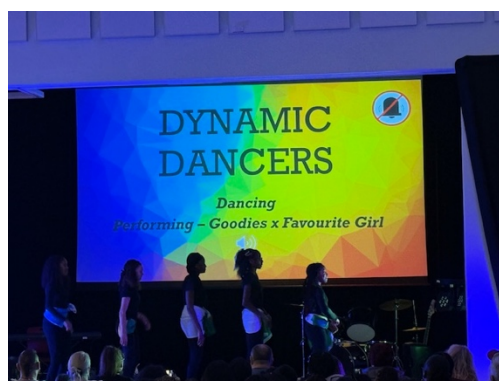
I wanted to shine the light on experienced performers as well as the most unexpected students – giving them a platform to build their confidence and the courage to display it.

This term, students in Year 7, Year 10, and Year 11 French classes took part in a meaningful intergenerational project as part of their French learning. Together, they wrote 120 Christmas cards to residents of EHPAD Les Landiers, a care home in Bron, near Lyon, France.

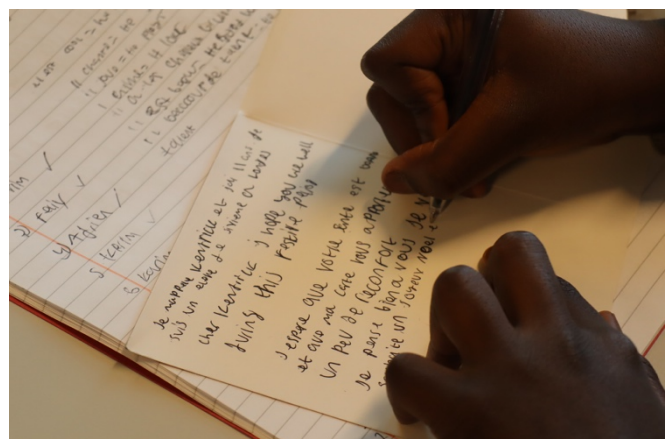
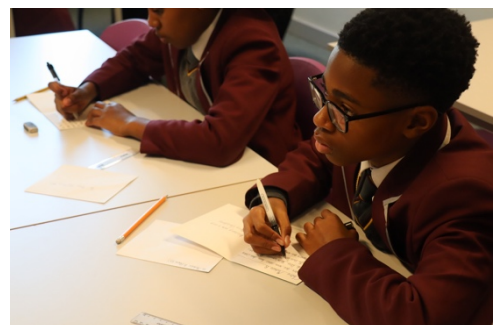
Through this project, students were encouraged not only to practise their written French, but also to reflect on loneliness during the festive period, particularly among elderly people. Each card carried a warm, personal message, sharing festive traditions, kind thoughts and a sense of connection across borders, languages and generations.

At the heart of this initiative was the idea of intergenerational solidarity: recognising that while generations may be separated by age, geography or experience, they can still support, learn from and care for one another. For many residents, receiving a handwritten card represents more than a seasonal greeting; it is a reminder that they are seen, remembered and valued.

By engaging in this project, students learned that small gestures can have a powerful impact. Writing a card became an act of empathy, respect and human connection; values that sit at the very heart of our school community.

We are incredibly proud of the care, thoughtfulness and maturity shown by our students, and grateful to the staff and residents of EHPAD Les Landiers for welcoming this exchange. This project reminded us all that education is not only about knowledge, but about nurturing compassionate, socially responsible young people who understand the importance of connection; especially at times when it matters most.

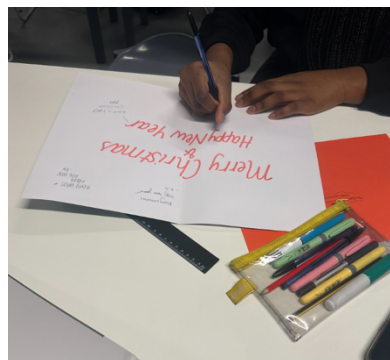


SIXTH FORM

Careers

Year 11 students have been attending their one-to-one careers guidance meetings this term. These meetings provide essential support in planning their next steps after GCSEs. Applications to sixth forms, colleges and apprenticeships are now underway and all students should ensure they have applied for both a first option and a back-up option following their mock results.

Year 13 students have been working on UCAS and Degree Apprenticeship applications. A number of students have already received excellent offers from institutions including Sheffield, Warwick, York and Manchester. In addition, some Year 13 students attended a careers fair at Tottenham Stadium, where they had the opportunity to speak directly with employers currently recruiting. This experience offered valuable insight into employer expectations and how best to prepare for work after sixth form.

A group of high-achieving Year 12 students took part in the 'Elephant Access' programme at Senate House. This initiative supports students aiming for competitive university pathways by helping them prepare throughout Year 12 for applications in Year 13. The day provided detailed information about the application process to top universities.

At the other end of the school, Year 7 students have been invited to complete the Future Skills Questionnaire. This allows us to understand the skills and attitudes students bring with them as they start secondary school, helping us to shape careers education to meet their needs. Year 7 will also be exploring careers further in upcoming PSHE sessions linked to the questionnaire.

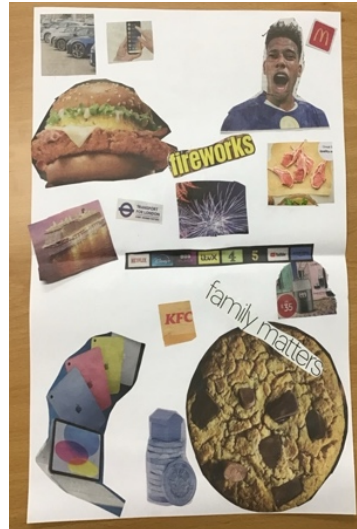


HOPE CENTRE
