


Hey You






Culture Day at Peninsula

Reception children have had a fantastic time celebrating Black History Month through a variety of creative and engaging activities.



It was a joyful a special experience for the children to take part in. A big thank you to Mrs Gibbs & Rev Dom!




MacMillian Cake Sale





The Zones of Regulation

We are excited to share a new program at school called **The Zones of Regulation**. This program is designed to help students better understand and manage their emotions, improve self-regulation skills, and develop strategies for staying focused and calm throughout the day. We have been teaching this programme over the Summer Term during our PSHE lessons. Each class uses a 'zones board' where children 'check in' with how they are feeling throughout the day.

What are the Zones of Regulation?

The Zones of Regulation uses four colored zones to help children identify how they are feeling:

- Blue Zone: Feeling sad, tired, or bored
- Green Zone: Feeling calm, happy, and ready to learn
- Yellow Zone: Feeling anxious, frustrated, or wiggly—starting to lose control
- Red Zone: Feeling angry, out of control, overly excited or distressed

By recognizing which zone they are in, students can learn to use different tools and strategies to help themselves move back to the Green Zone, where they are best able to focus and learn.

Why are we using this program?

The Zones of Regulation supports students' emotional well-being and helps build important life skills like self-awareness, self-control, and problem-solving. We believe these skills will not only help students at school but also at home and in their daily lives.

How can you help at home?

We encourage you to talk with your child about the Zones and ask them how they're feeling. You can also explore different calming strategies together, like deep breathing, taking a break, or using positive self-talk.
