“Through Operation Forgiveness, Sarah and Tayo describe the devastating impact of Zac’s death, but also how they each came to forgive the boys who murdered him.

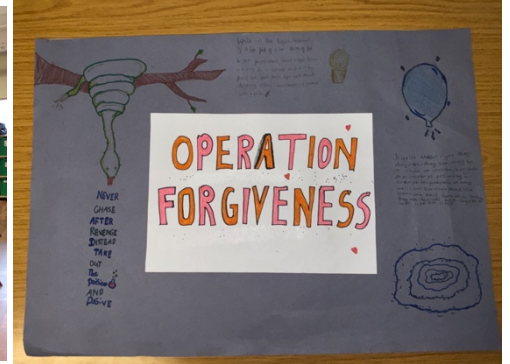
They describe the impact of their Christian faith in their two very different journeys to forgiveness – and that although forgiveness can be difficult, it is ultimately liberating.

It was a powerful and moving session that encouraged pupils to reflect on the meaning of forgiveness and how it can help resolve anger before it grows out of control.

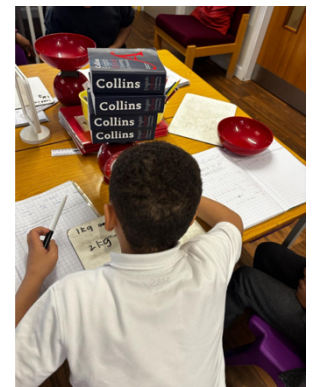
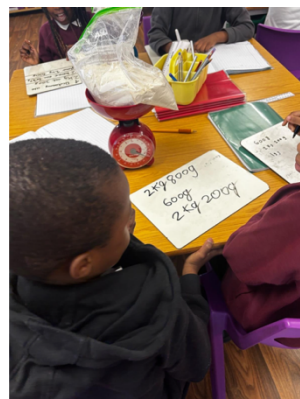


Measuring in Maths

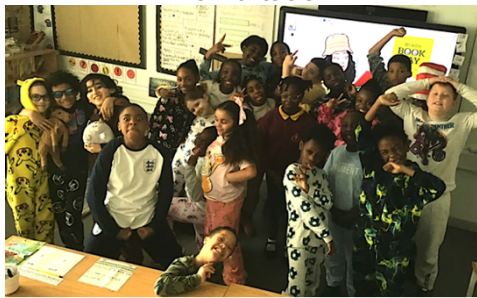
Celebrating World Book Day

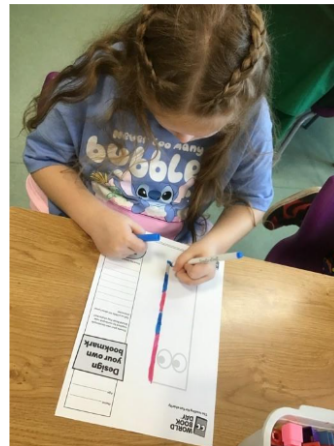


Celebrating a love of reading this World Book Day! 📖✨

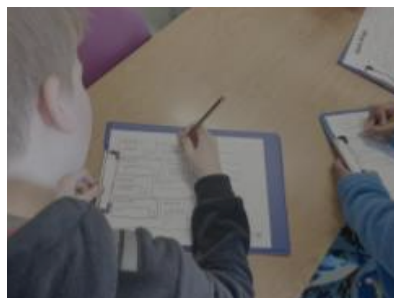
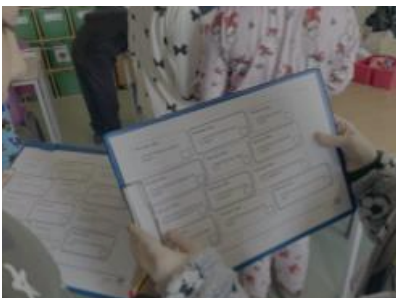

GCSE Geography Field Trip to Shoeburyness and Stratford

Our GCSE and year 12 Geography students recently took part in an exciting and valuable field trip to Shoeburyness and Stratford as part of their coursework preparation and GCSE exams. The trip provided an excellent opportunity for students to apply their classroom learning to real-world environments while developing important fieldwork and data collection skills.

The day began with a visit to Shoeburyness on the Essex coast, where students investigated coastal processes and management strategies. Working in small groups, they carried out a range of fieldwork activities including measuring beach profiles, analysing sediment size, and observing coastal defences such as groynes and sea walls.

Students also considered the impacts of erosion and the effectiveness of different management techniques in protecting the coastline. Despite the chilly sea breeze, students remained enthusiastic and fully engaged in the investigation.

After completing the coastal study, the group travelled to Stratford to explore urban regeneration. This part of the trip focused on the transformation of the area following the London 2012 Olympics. Students examined how investment and redevelopment have changed land use, infrastructure, and opportunities for local communities.

They conducted environmental quality surveys, and field sketch around the East Village and Carpenter Estate.

The fieldwork collected during the day will now be used by students in their GCSE Geography coursework, where they will analyse and interpret their findings. This process helps them build essential skills in data analysis, evaluation, and geographical enquiry.

We were extremely proud of the students' behaviour, teamwork, and curiosity throughout the trip. They represented the school brilliantly and showed great maturity when working independently in both locations.

Experiences like this are a vital part of geography education, allowing students to see how the topics they study in class shape the real world around them. We look forward to seeing how they use their data in their upcoming exams and coursework.

Another highlight of the day was the Teacher Character Hunt. Students were given clues to work out which book characters their teachers had dressed up as, creating lots of excitement and discussion throughout the day.

To ensure every student could continue the celebration beyond the classroom, all students were given a World Book Day token. These tokens can be used at major retailers to collect a free book or to receive £1 off a book of their choice.

Overall, the day was a fantastic celebration of reading and storytelling. Events like these reflect the importance we place at St Mary Magdalene C of E School on reading for pleasure.

GENERAL

Do you receive Universal Credit?

Individuals receiving Universal Credit and other qualifying benefits can purchase £1 tickets to several major UK attractions, including the [Tower of London](#), [Kensington Palace](#), [Hampton Court Palace](#), and Royal residences. These discounted tickets are generally available for up to six people per household, and proof of benefit must be shown upon entry.

Key Attractions with £1 Tickets

- **Historic Royal Palaces:** £1 entry for the Tower of London, Hampton Court Palace, and Kensington Palace,
- **Royal Collection Trust:** £1 tickets to Windsor Castle, Buckingham Palace (State Rooms), Palace of Holyroodhouse, Royal Mews, and Queen's Galleries in London/Edinburgh.
- [Kew Gardens](#): £1 or £2 entry.
- **London Transport Museum:** £1 for an unlimited annual pass.
- [St Paul's Cathedral](#): £1 sightseeing tickets.
- [Roald Dahl Museum](#): £1 tickets for families.
- [Cadw Sites](#): £1 tickets for various Welsh monuments.

How to Claim

- **Eligibility:** Applies to Universal Credit, Working Tax Credit, Pension Credit, Employment and Support Allowance, Income Support, and Jobseeker's Allowance.
- **Booking:** Tickets should be booked online in advance, selecting the "Universal Credit" option.
- **Documentation:** You must bring proof of eligibility (a recent Universal Credit statement) and a photo ID.
- **Capacity:** The offer usually covers up to 6 people per household.
