Personal, social, health education (PSHE) and citizenship helps to give pupils the knowledge, skills and understanding they need to lead confident, healthy, independent lives and to become informed, active, responsible citizens. Pupils are encouraged to take part in a wide range of activities and experiences across, and beyond the curriculum, contributing fully to the life of the school and communities. In doing so they learn to recognize their own worth, work well with others and become increasingly responsible for their own learning. They reflect upon their experiences and understand how they are developing personally and socially, tackling many of the spiritual, moral, social and cultural issues that are part of growing up. They also find out about the main political and social institutions that affect their lives and about their responsibilities, rights and duties as individuals and members of communities. They learn to understand and respect our common humanity diversity and differences so that they can go on to form effective, fulfilling relationships that are an essential part of life and learning.

Aims of the policy

The aims of the policy are:

- Developing confidence and responsibility and making the most of their abilities
- Preparing to play an active role as citizens
- Developing a healthy, safer lifestyle
- Developing good relationships and respecting the differences between people

The children will be taught through:

Assessment and Monitoring

The Governor's papers state that "It is expected that the report to parents will include information about their children's progress in PSHE and Citizenship".

- The children's end of year report has a section that teachers are required to complete about the children's progress in PSHE and Citizenship.
- Staff assess how the children's knowledge, skills and understanding has progressed throughout each topic. This could be a drama activity, circling pictures and key words, or reading feelings/emotions in pictures, or any other activity that the class teacher thinks appropriate.
- Class teachers also assess PSHE continually on a daily basis e.g. playground behaviour, working and co-operating in groups.

Role and duties of the chair of Governors:

- 1. To be involved in the development & review of the PSHE and Citizenship policy.
- 2. To represent the Governing body with regard to PSHE and Citizenship issues within the school.
- 3. To play a role in ensuring the policy is made known to the whole school community.
