

This is a great way to use your phonic sounds **and** practice your cursive writing!






Here is some great work produced by pupils in **Chessun Class** this week via satchel.

Some hard work in Maths, going above and beyond our work in adding 1-digit numbers to 2-digit numbers.








Record of Practical Learning Sanders Class

- Caring for one another





























O frabjous day! Callooh! Callay!"


