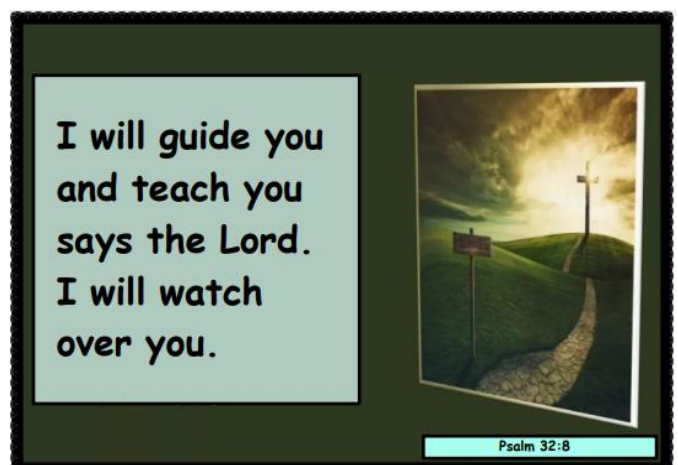
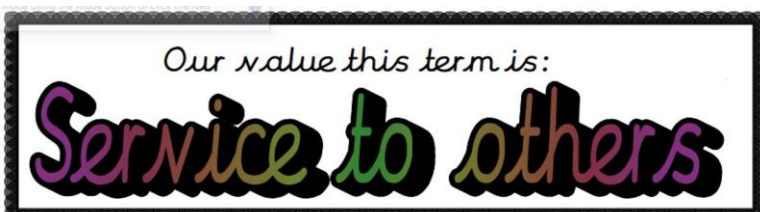

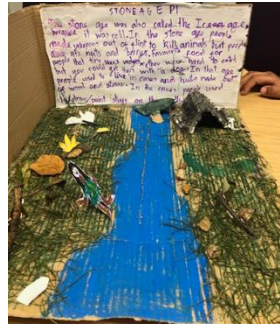


Celebration of Learning

Year Three have been learning about the Stone Age and had a homework project to make models to show their learning. Aren't they amazing!



Deborah – I made a stone age model with a toad, a river, grass, stone age house and white and black rocks.



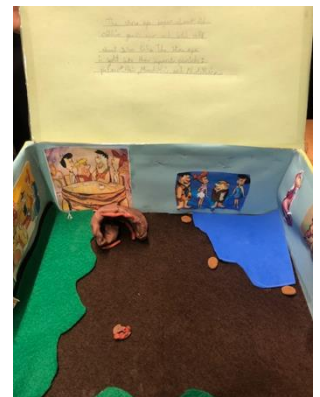
Nevan – this is a model of the stone age. I have made a person sitting beside a campfire to keep them warm. They lived in caves.

Adeline - My mum and dad helped me make it. My mum and me had an idea to put a light inside to make a fire. I drew some stone age pictures inside and I also make a waterfall with loads of tiny glitter fish inside; the silver one is special. My stone age boy is entering the cave. My dad made the cave look realistic and also we used real stones to make some of the details look good and pop out.



Aisha – me and my mum made it and there is a man in the tree to get a better aim to hunt the bears. I used real grass to make grass in my model.

Athina – me and mum made this model. There is blue sea made out of foam. I also made grass from green felt. I made a cave out of clay. My dad printed out some pictures of the Flintstones and then I made some play dough rocks. I also used sugar paper to add colour. I also used green sugar paper to make it more colourful and add then I added facts about the stone age. I added brown felt to make soil.



Ellie – me and my dad made the model and he thought we could add real things to make it look realistic. And we imagined that we were inside the model with other people and I was really proud at the end.



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A message from the School Chaplain, Rev Dom

What is it about names? What's so special about them?

In centuries past, names described us – either the family we belonged to or the role, the skill or the part we played in our community.

Names like Smith, Fletcher, Cooper and many more described our skills in the community.

Titles were then added to our names according to the status that were given – Lord, Esquire, Lady, Countess. Some of these can still be found in online ordering systems – especially shops like Harrods and Liberty!!

But what about our names – the names were given, the names we choose for ourselves.

Whether it is a professional name, a personal name or nickname.

In the deaf community people also have sign names that are special and unique to them.

Maybe there is a story behind your name?

Our names speak of our identity – to ourselves and to others.

Maybe you have considered what your name means to you.

Maybe you've considered what you want others might call you and what that means.

I am Dominic to my parents, Dom to friends and Rev Dom to hundreds of children locally.

A friend at school used to call me Donamic, whilst an adult friend called me Damien for ages.

Maybe you've been at a meeting or a conference when they've got your name wrong, or written it wrong on a badge, or introduced you in a way that you wouldn't have chosen.

What is it about names?

Jesus called people by name. He used their names to speak to them about deep things.

It feels like he knew everyone's names.

He spoke confidently to Zaccheus in the tree who needed to be forgiven.

He spoke calmly to Mary in the garden when she discovered his resurrection.

He spoke clearly to Peter to set him on a path to begin something amazing.

Names speak of belonging. Of knowing people and addressing them with respect and value and concern. Names help us feel known and heard and understood. They convey safety and trust.

In a moment of stillness let us recognise our own name and the names of those we love – those who come to mind instantly – those who need to be seen and loved.

In a moment of prayer let us be reminded of those who God created this world for, that Christ died for, and that the spirit seeks to bless.

O lord you search me and know me. You know when I sit or stand, my work and my rest, my words and thoughts and deeds.

Where I go, you are there, your strength and protection and love and care are with me.

I am wonderfully made, I am made in your image.

Remind us of our identity that is blessed by you.

Support us to see the amazingsness of others and know them by name.

Bless us with your spirit that we might offer your blessing to others in our care.

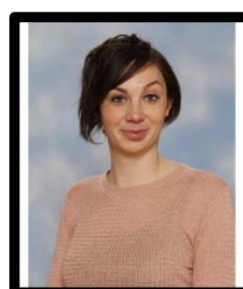

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Useful Information

The start and end of the school Day

Gates open for drop off between **8.40 am and 8.55 am** for all pupils. Please try not to arrive too early as we cannot open the gate until 8.40am. Pupils should be collected promptly at the end of the day at **3.10 pm**. Please ensure your child's pick-up arrangements are communicated with the school. Reception pupils are dismissed from the classroom and Year 1 - 4 pupils line up and are dismissed from the MUGA pitch.

Attendance and Punctuality

We would like to encourage 100% attendance and welcome your support with this. Children who are not in school by **8.55 am**, miss out on the essential information that class teachers give their children, as well as the settling down time each morning, in preparation for a day of fun, interesting learning. Please contact the school office letting us know why your child is not in school. Ensure you collect your child promptly at the end of the day. It is putting a considerable strain on staffing having pupils collected late and we might have to introduce a late collection penalty fee going forward.

SCHOOL DINNERS

School dinners are FREE to all children in school. Please take up this opportunity. Dinners are prepared and cooked fresh each day in our own kitchen.

PACKED LUNCH

If your child brings a packed lunch to school, please ensure it is healthy and does not include nuts, sweets, chocolate or fizzy drinks. All packed lunch bags should be well labelled. Your child will keep their lunch box with them in the classroom rather than using the school fridges. **If your child wishes to change from packed lunch to school dinners, please ensure you let the school office know. This is to ensure all children receive a meal.**

SNACKS

Children in year groups Reception, 1 and 2 are provided with a piece of fruit each day. Pupils in Years 3, 4, 5 and 6 are permitted to bring in fruit for a snack at break time – no other food is allowed, especially nuts, we are a **NO NUT school**.

UNIFORM

PLEASE ENSURE ALL CLOTHES ARE CLEARLY LABELLED WITH YOUR CHILD'S NAME. Lost property will be given to charity at the end of each term!

Please ensure that your child is wearing the correct uniform. Shoes and trainers should be black.

BREAKFAST CLUB

If your child requires a place at our breakfast club. Please telephone the office and speak to them about reserving a place.

WATER BOTTLES

Please ensure that your child brings a water bottle to school each day. It needs to be clearly labelled with your child's name.
