Dear Parent/Carers ,

It has been two weeks since I last wrote to you, within which time a lot of national and international events have occurred. I would like to share some important updates and changes to be implemented soon, but also write to you about the racial justice we as a Federation and millions around the world are striving and fighting for.

Plans for the rest of the academic year

It is now confirmed that there will be no return to school for our Year 7, Year 8 or Year 9 students this academic year. This means that home learning is even more important than before and it is imperative that this work is completed at home to the best of all students' ability. As there will be no end of year formal assessment, determining ability sets for next year will take the standard of work students are completing from home into account. I would like to encourage a real drive to further improve the submission rates for all of our students as well as the standard of work produced. We will need full parental support in order to achieve this.

Year 10 phased return to school

I can also now confirm that <u>Year 10 will begin a phased return to school from Monday 15th June</u>. Thank you to the parents who have responded to the parent questionnaire, outlining your thoughts on this return and whether or not your child will return to school. If you haven't completed the questionnaire sent on Friday 22nd May, please do this as soon as possible. I will send a separate letter to Year 10 parents next week, outlining the plans and sharing which days your child will be expected to attend school.

Protest in London

Following the death of George Floyd, protests against systematic racism have spread around the world. We as a Federation stand in solidarity with our school communities and those across the world who are understandably angry, distressed and grieving. As I am sure you are aware, London has already experienced and is gearing up for further peaceful protests for the #BlackLivesMatter movement. We have created opportunities for our students to reflect on these current issues via online Head of Year assemblies which students will be able to view next week.

I would just like to remind all within our school community to ensure you remain COVID safe, if you choose to attend a protest. Peaceful protests are difficult when large gatherings are still banned across the UK under lockdown restrictions, and the coronavirus R-rate remains disconcertingly high. The central London locations of the protests will inevitably mean crowding on local bus and tube services, which also carries a risk in terms of spreading coronavirus. So please be safe and protect yourself.
