Dear Parent/Carers,

I hope you are all well and keeping safe.

Last week, the Prime Minister announced that it will not be possible to resume face-to-face learning immediately after the February half term and instead there are hopes it will be safe to commence the reopening of schools and colleges from Monday 8th March, at the earliest. What this means in the short term is that we will continue our remote learning package for the entire school and continue with learning at school for parents who are key workers for at least the next four school weeks. <u>Please note, the week beginning Monday 15th February is officially half term and there will be no online learning set.</u>

I would like to thank parents/carers for their continual support of our students with home learning. Our submission rates are higher than at any point during any version of lockdown over the past year. Miss Brady would like to share the following:
