Year 7 CCD trips:

History Trip

The Year 7 History went to the National Maritime Museum to explore different exhibitions and displays. Students explored the diverese and inclusive stories of people and the sea and trace links between Britain and the wider world. The trip covered topics such as migration, empire and enslavement. This day was taught allongside our first enquiry in Y7: How has migration and the sea changed the face of Greenwich Through Time? Museum collections are a powerful starting point for sparking curiosity, generating ideas and creating discussions around diverse narratives such as Billy Water; African Romans, African Tudors, African Sailors in the British Empire, the Lascar Sailors from India and migration in the Industrial Revolution.

Art & DT Trip

Yesterday, Year 7 students had an amazing day out on their cross curricular Art & DT trip. Students visited Shoreditch and the surroundings with the aim explore graffiti Art along with food and culture from the local area. For many of our students it was the first time they visited that part of London but also, they were particularly excited as it was the first time going anywhere since the pandemic. To start our day, students got a surprise when the owner of Boxpark Roger Wade spoke to them about his journey to founding the brand BoxFresh and later Boxpark itself. Pupils were able to ask Roger Wade about set-backs he faced and how he overcame them. Throughout the day students explored the street art and graffiti scattered throughout Shoreditch, sampled food from Spitalfields market as well as experience the vibrant and diverse cultures along Brink Lane. Students ended the day with a lovely lunch sat by the river Thames before heading back to school. Pupils completed sensory evaluations and observational sketches throughout the day. As a result of the trip, many of our students have begun thinking about possible careers in the Arts or DT particularly on hearing about Roger Wade's story and that he also grew up in Greenwich.

Student Voices on Decolonised and Diverse History Curriculum

The students at St Mary Magdalene's were given the opportunity to share their experiences of learning history in both a diverse and decolonised way. The History Department has been working closely with the National Maritime Museum on Decolonising Local History. As a result, our students' voices were heard at the Teaching Inclusive Histories Event held at the Museum (<u>click here</u> for video). The event was also an opportunity for Jack Brown (Subject Lead) to share best practice on approaches to Decolonising Local History by exploring diversity within our local histories and exposing the links between local and difficult histories such as Transatlantic Enslavement, Empire and the interconnected Legacies of the two.
