Dear parents/carers of Year 12 students,

Your son/daughter will be sitting their first A-Level mock examinations in March. These mock exams will be used to give teachers vital information on your child's strengths, weaknesses and misconceptions and will enable your child's teachers to support them with their learning. Along with the end of Year 12 examinations in June, these mock exam grades will also be used as evidence for your child's 'predicted grades' which will be submitted to universities.

On this letter, you will find a timetable of the exams and a table showing what each exam will assess. In some subjects, there are modular units or NEA taking place in the coming months; details of these are on the final page.

All students should now be revising at home daily in addition to working hard in school and completing all homework. We recommend that students revise by creating notes to summarise their learning; use flashcards to test themselves; and answer past paper questions to implement their knowledge. By revising all their subjects and regularly returning to the same topics, students can make themselves well-prepared for exams. We ask that you help your child to follow a regular revision timetable, that you ask them questions about their work, support them in being organised, and make sure they are eating and sleeping well.

During the period of mock exams, students should continue to arrive at school at the usual time and when they do not have exams, students will attend their regular lessons. Students will have a lunch break slightly earlier than usual on any days they have afternoon exams. Most mock exams will take place in the Lecture Theatre.

All students must bring their own equipment, including a black biro pen. Any other equipment required (e.g. pencils, sharpener, calculator, etc) must be stored in a transparent pencil case. Electronic devices such as phones and wristwatches must be placed in students' bags and kept at the back of the Lecture Theatre or other secure storage. If students are late to an exam, they may be allowed to enter at our discretion. I must make it clear that any student not following the examination regulations will be dealt with accordingly, and may result in students being given a 'U' grade for the examination.

Those students who have been assessed for special provision in the exams will receive more information and support from Ms Graham and our inclusion team. Students re-sitting English or Maths GCSEs will sit GCSE mock exams during this week or the following week; more information will be provided by their teachers in due course.
