### What is Law?

Law is the study of the interactions between legal rules, morals, justice, and society. The subject enables students to gain understanding of the legal system that governs society and apply the rules to real life situations. Throughout the two-year course students will develop a range of skills including critical analysis, decision-making, problem solving and the ability to present a logical argument.

### What Will I Study?

#### **Paper 1:**

- The nature of law and the English legal system.
- Criminal Law

#### **Paper 2:**

- The nature of law and the English legal system
- Tort Law

#### **Paper 3:**

- The nature of law and the English legal system
- Law of Contract **or** Human Rights

### What entry requirements will I need?

In addition to the general entry requirements you will need a Grade 6 in English Language or English Literature.

### How will I be taught?

Students will learn through a variety of methods including case studies, mock trials, discussion, debates and group work. Students will be expected to carry out independent reading and research in order to consolidate and extend lesson content outside of their timetabled lesson time.

### How will I be assessed?

**Paper 1:** 2 hour written paper (worth 33.3% of the A Level)

**Paper 2:** 2 hour written paper (worth 33.3% of the A Level)

**Paper 3:** 2 hour written paper (worth 33.3% of the A Level)

All assessments will be a combination of multiple choice, short answers and extended writing questions.

### What career opportunities does this open up?
