What is English Literature?

English Literature at SMM6 will provide you with a mix of literary analysis, contextual thinking, wider reading and independent learning. This course will offer a clear progression from secured skills from GCSE to a deeper development at A-Level English.

After two years of studying A Level English Literature you will develop a discipline and enjoyment of reading through a variety of texts. You will also analyse, evaluate and undertake independent research which are valuable for both further study and future employment.

What will I study?

Component 1: Drama

Students study:

- one Shakespeare play and one other drama from either tragedy or comedy both texts may be selected from one or both of these categories.
- critical essays related to their selected Shakespeare play. Students' preparation is supported by Shakespeare: A Critical Anthology - Tragedy or Shakespeare: A Critical Anthology - Comedy.

Component 2: Prose

Students study:

• two prose texts from a chosen theme. At least one of the prose texts must be pre-1900. We currently student Frankenstein and A Handmaid's Tale.

Component 3: Poetry

Students study:

- a selection of post-2000 specified poetry (Poems of the Decade)
- a named poet from within a literary period. (Keats)
- unseen poetry

What entry requirements will I need?

In addition to the general entry requirements you will need a grade 6 minimum in English Language and Literature.

How will I be taught?

Students will learn through a variety of different methods such as group discussions, pair work and independent learning. Where possible students will also be encouraged to watch live performances of plays.

How will I be assessed?

Paper 1: 2 hours 15 minues written paper (worth 30% of the A-Level) Paper 2: 1 hours 15 minutes written paper (worth 20% of the A-Level) Paper 3: 2 hours 15 minutes written paper (worth 30% of the A-Level) **NEA (Coursework):** 1 comparative essay (worth 20% of the A-Level)

What career opportunities does this open up?

Students of English Literature can go on to study Law, History, Politics, Journalism, Advertising and Media, as well as literature-based degree courses.
