**GOING CASHLESS**

### THE START AND END OF THE SCHOOL DAY

School starts at 8.50am and all children should be in the playground by 8.45am. The school gates open at 8.30am every day. Pupils should be collected promptly from school at 3.15pm. All pupils line up in the playground and (apart from Reception pupils who are collected from their classroom door) should be collected from the Muga pitch at the end of the day.

~~Some children have been repeatedly collected/picked up late at the end of the school day.~~ The school day ends at **3.15 pm**. It is your parental responsibility to collect your child on time. This also applies to prompt collection if they are in attendance of any after school club. We are reviewing the current system and wanted to inform you that we may have to change, or charge for children waiting for their older to be picked to be

~~collected up siblings.~~—The number of siblings waiting is now much greater than when we first moved into the building as well as the length of time that they need supervising. We are aware that at the end of the school day some of our primary pupils wait for their older siblings from the secondary phase to take them home. For over a year, we have been happy to provide 15 minutes free child care and supervise the children who are waiting. However, this has now become a staffing issue due to the lateness of the secondary aged students collecting their siblings. More recently, older siblings have been arriving after 3.30pm and frequently between 3.45–4pm. This has been due the secondary aged child receiving a same day detention or even forgetting that this role has been asked of them.

### SOCIAL MEDIA

This year we have dealt with several incidents where some children have been using **WhatsApp** to say unacceptable things to one another. The legal age for having a WhatsApp account is 16+, therefore it is illegal for the children to be using this app. **Tik Tok** is a lip-syncing video app open to the world, so mature content can (and does) appear in the stream. Because of the access to inappropriate content, and the use of popular music that may contain explicit language, this is not an app for young children. **TikTok** is intended for 13+ years.

We urge parents and carers to monitor their child's use of their devices and the Apps they are accessing. Messages sent on group chats and online videos are seen by a wide audience. Therefore, please ensure that children are using Apps that are age appropriate and that they are showing respect and kindness to others whilst using their mobile phones or communicating online. **We as a school cannot accept responsibility for how the children use social media, this is the parent's responsibility.** As a school we do our best to educate our pupils in how to be safe online and also support the children to get on well with one another and resolve issues between them. ### TELLING STORIES – MAKING SENSE OF THE WORLD:

This week I have had the opportunity to share stories with many of the children and young people around the federation. Stories from the Bible, stories out of books, traditional stories and also stories from my own life. Stories help us make sense of the world around us. We tell stories to explain what we are doing, how we got here and where we want to go in life. We tell stories to help us make sense of other people's behaviour, of the way people act to us and around us. We tell stories about ourselves and about other people all the time. Sometimes we tell them to other people and at other times we tell ourselves stories. But they are not always true: Elijah told himself a story that God was not with him, but God proved otherwise. Moses told himself a story that he was not good enough, but God convinced him that with God's help he would be great. Sometimes we tell ourselves that people won't like us, that they won't pick us, that they don't want us: But some of these stories are not true either. Why not practice telling yourself some new stories: A story that God loves you and wants the best for you, that if you do your best, give what you can and think kindly of others then good things can happen. Try remembering a story in your life when you succeeded in something, a story of when you laughed a lot, a story of when you felt cared for and encouraged. These are the stories that will help the world feel warmer and kinder. These are the stories that will help you see God at work in your life.
