

Future Frontiers – careers coaching office visits

This Spring 30 Year 10 students were nominated for the Future Frontiers careers coaching programme. This programme consists of 4 trips to volunteer company offices where students are paired up with trained coaches for 1-2-1 guidance sessions on linking their interests and skills with future careers. The students were split into 2 groups with half going to Zaha Hadid Architecture offices in Angel, and the others going to Argus Media offices in Holborn. This will be followed up by 2 sessions in Year 11 to provide further guidance with post-16 options and applications.

<u>The Inspirational Learning Group – Y8 National Careers Challenge</u>

On Thursday 19th January the Inspirational Learning Group visited the school to deliver the National Careers Challenge to Year 8. This involved students working in groups of 6 to design a brand new zero emissions fleet for AirBus. The students had to consider their customers, unique selling points, slogan, logo & additional features such as hydrogen fuel cells and use of artificial intelligence. Groups who had worked well all day were then selected to present in front of the year group and a guest judging panel, with the winning group from 8AGZ being invited to compete at the National finals in the summer!


